

News from the Atlanta Metro Lions

Our special guests were members from the Jasper Lions Club, PCC Mark Miller, Lion Leslie Miller, PDG Charles Chapman, Lion Peggie Chapman, and Lion Clint Chapman. It is always a pleasure to have them at our event.

Then, on November 4th at our regular business meeting, Nathaniel Dyer of Atlenium (an organization for underprivileged children) presented 2 awards to the club for contributing to his 2010 Spring Break Camp for the children in the Vine City Community of Atlanta. Atlenium provided a much needed camp in that neighborhood for children of working mothers who would not have had any activities for that week. And, on November 6th, members attended the District Cabinet Meeting in High Point, GA. PDG Vanessa Stanley and club president Shelia Morrow attended the Club Excellence Process Workshop led by PCC Mark Miller. They have put together ideas from the workshop that can entice and bring in new members to the club.

On November 20th, the club helped sponsor and volunteered hours for National Adoption Day at the Fulton County Juvenile Justice Center. This is a national day in which foster parents are allowed to adopt the children into their families. There were 24 families that adopted

children that day. They ranged from infants to 16 years old. There was a little 10 year old girl who cried and cheered because she had begun to believe that no one would ever want her. Ten members volunteered at the event.

On October 6th, the Atlanta Metro Lions Club was asked to tour the Southwest Atlanta Community with Atlanta Mayor, Kasim Reed and the NPU leader of District 10, and its leaders, regarding neighborhood improvements. There are a lot of empty houses and depression in the neighborhoods they toured and members provided input as to the revitalization of these areas. Lion Preston McCoy was Lion project leader and others in attendance were Lions Jean Ector, Bert Ricks, Willie Alexander and John Wilson. The tour and discussion lasted for about 3 ½ hours. Later in October, members of our club also went to Ellijay to help with their Apple Festival. Our members always look forward to helping out at the Festival because of the fellowship in serving with the Ellijay Lions.

The club has already begun contributions to the Lighthouse Capital Campaign. The club has pledged \$10,000 to the campaign but has member pledges that totals over \$12,000. The club has also donated over 4,000 pairs of used eyeglasses to the Lighthouse since September 2010. Atlanta Metro Club is having a toy drive for children in the Simpson Road area where we help sponsor the annual Fire Station 16 Christmas Party that provides food, toys, bikes and fun for over 60 families in that community. These are likely the only toys and gifts that these children will receive for Christmas. We have about 15 members that have signed up to help decorate, wrap toys, serve food and do whatever is necessary to make the party a success.

Lion Lynn was one of the key players in the formation of the Band, and has put many hours of hard work into the organization since its inception in 1997. She has served as state chair for the last 5 years. During the same meeting of the Council, they appointed Lion Leslie Miller as the new state chair. Lion Leslie served as state chair 2001-2003.


Due to many factors, not the least of which is the cost of the trips to International Convention, the Band has struggled for the past few years in its efforts to recruit students from around the state. The new proposal,

accepted by the Council at its recent meeting, was that the Lions of Georgia host a marching band contest in an effort to find a high school within the state to represent us in the parade at the International Convention. The first marching contest will take place in the fall of 2013, so a band can be chosen to travel to the convention in Toronto in 2014. To help offset the cost of this trip, the band will be awarded a \$5000 donation. The idea is that the marching contest will become self-sustaining, generating the funds that go to the band that is selected.

Lions Clubs International Foundation, or LCIF, supports the humanitarian work of Lions in making a greater impact in their local communities, as well as around the world. Through LCIF, Lions give sight, support youth, provide disaster relief and combat disability. Following are a few ways you can support LCIF.....

The Melvin Jones Fellowship recognizes donations of US\$1,000. It is the backbone of LCIF, providing 75 percent of the foundation's revenue. A recognition of humanitarian work, an MJF is an honor presented to those who donate US\$1,000 to LCIF or to people for whom a donation was made by others. Contributions can be made by individuals (including non-Lions), clubs or districts. Contributions can be made in one sum, or in installments of a minimum of US\$100 over a five-year period. It is possible to make a donation and choose the MJF recipient later. Write "Melvin Jones Fellow to be named later" on the check or bank draft.

The **Contributing Membership** program is an annual program that recognizes three levels of support: US \$20, US\$50 and US\$100.

For US\$20, donors receive a Contributing Member lapel pin identifying the fiscal year in which the donation is made. For US\$50, donors receive a pin and a silver wreath. Opening Eyes Program Celebrates 10 Years

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has a long history of supporting initiatives to help disabled populations. Through Opening Eyes, a partnership program between Lions Clubs International and Special Olympics, Lions clubs members around the world volunteer at Special Olympics games, registering athletes, conducting vision screenings and fitting glasses. More than 12,000 Lions have volunteered in the Opening Eyes program, and LCIF has contributed more than US\$12.2 million in funding in support of this program.

Research has shown that among Special Olympics athletes, 68 percent have not had an eye examination in three years, 37 percent are in need of eyeglasses and 18 percent wear clinically incorrect eyeglasses. Through the partnership, Lions are helping to improve eye care services. In addition, the partnership is helping to train additional vision care specialists on how to provide better vision care to this population.

Lions, Partners Provide Trachoma Treatment to 10 Million in Ethiopia

BAHIR DAR, AMHARA REGION,
ETHIOPIA, November 2, 2010 – Today a
group of Lions led by Lions Clubs
International President Sid L. Scruggs III
joined with partners to launch MalTra, a
week-long combined treatment campaign
aimed at controlling both malaria and
trachoma. The antibiotic, Zithromax®,
donated by program partner Pfizer Inc, is a
critical part of Lions and partners' strategy in
the fight against the blinding disease in
underdeveloped, rural areas.

"As Lions, we are passionate about eliminating preventable blindness, and through SightFirst we dream to see and end of this debilitating disease," said Scruggs. "Strong partnerships are essential to successfully tackling public health problems at this magnitude and the strong partnership among Lions, The Carter Center, the Amhara Regional Health Bureau, the International Trachoma Initiative and Pfizer is invaluable."

During the first MalTra week in November 2008, 4.8 million people were treated. Since then, the campaign has been conducted every six months, treating more people and alternating between east and west Amhara. This is the fifth annual MalTra week event. Lions have helped in mobilizing more than 15,000 community volunteers to ensure more than 10 million people in more than 4,500 villages receive twice-annually the drug that will help prevent trachoma as well as protect them against other common infections. At the same time, Lions and partners distributed bed nets to protect against malaria-carrying mosquito bites and will also provide community education on ways to prevent both trachoma and malaria.

President Scruggs and his wife Judy, Past
President Jim Ervin and his wife Sharon,
Lions of Ethiopia and Lions Clubs
International Foundation staff participated in
administering the first dose and launching the
week-long initiative. Representatives from
The Carter Center, the national trachoma

program, government of Ethiopia, including the national president and state presidents, the International Trachoma Initiative and Pfizer joined the celebration.

Bahir Dar is located in the most trachomaendemic area of the country. Together with the Amhara Regional Health Bureau, the international coalition is working to eliminate trachoma as a source of blindness from the region by 2012.

"This campaign is of great significance to us as it targets trachoma and malaria, two major health problems of our communities in Amhara region at an unprecedented scale" said H.E. Ato Ayalew Gobezie, president of the regional state.

A disease caused by bacterial infection, trachoma is the leading cause of preventable blindness worldwide. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), trachoma affects about 84 million people, of whom about 8 million are visually impaired and have lost their sight. Another 500 million are at risk worldwide. It is estimated that there are 1 million Ethiopians suffering from severe trachoma who are at risk of immediate blindness, 600,000 of whom live in Amhara.

"We shouldn't allow malaria and trachoma to prey on Ethiopian people, destroying lives and jeopardizing the country's future," said Dr. John B. Hardman, CEO and president of The Carter Center. "We should do everything possible to support the Ministry of Health scale-up interventions to assist all the people of Ethiopia so that they can realize their full potential free from these devastating diseases."

Trachoma control is based on the WHO integrated strategy known as SAFE – Surgery, Antibiotics, Facial cleanliness, and Environmental improvement. It is Ethiopia's goal to eliminate trachoma from Amhara by 2012 for the entire population at risk, around 18 million people. Antibiotics are necessary

to reducing trachoma in addition to improved sanitation and hand and face washing.

LCIF has helped distributed more than 42 million doses of Zithromaz to help fight trachoma. This, the fifth MalTra campaign, will be the first time when more than half the people in the region will be treated at once. It will also see the administration of the 225-millionth dose of the antibiotic Zithromax®, donated by Pfizer Inc through the International Trachoma Initiative (ITI) globally. Ethiopia has received 32 percent of the global donation of Zithromax® since the program's inception, representing an approximate value of US\$1.6 billion.

"We are delighted to be part of such an inspiring collaboration and model public health campaign - the latest in our ongoing commitment to eliminate blinding trachoma by 2020," said Dr Freda Lewis-Hall, Senior Vice President and Chief Medical Officer, Pfizer Inc. "Like all of the health programs Pfizer is involved in across this region, it's the strength of the partnership between the organizations and health professionals involved that makes large scale events such as MalTra week possible."

LCIF has been involved with blindness prevention and treatment for 20 years through their SightFirst program. In addition to educating communities on sight diseases and helping to distribute azithromycin to fight trachoma, Lions in Ethiopia have organized and supported tens of thousands of cataract operations, training of ophthalmic nurses and surgeons, and strengthening of eye care centers in rural and underserved areas.

DISTRICT 18A HALL OF FAME



District 18A Hall of Fame International Association of Lions Clubs

What is the District Hall of Fame?

At the annual District Convention, the Past District Governor's Association inducts up to six living or deceased Lions into the District Hall of Fame. Membership in the Hall of Fame is District 18A's highest honor. It recognizes a lifetime commitment by the recipient to Lions Service in District 18A.

How is the selection made?

Local Lions Clubs and Past District Governors may nominate one living or deceased Lion for induction into the HOF each year. From the applications, the three most recent Past District Governors select the inductees each year. Selection is based on the level of contribution the Lion has made to Lionism on the District and Local level. The nominee must have been a registered Lion in District 18A for ten years. Leadership that the Lion has provided his community at large is also considered. The selection committee is now restricted to only six (6) honorees each year.

Who pays for the award?

Accompanying the application must be a check for \$65.00 payable to the District 18A Past District Governors. This fee covers the cost of the award. If the application is not accepted, the check will be returned.

When do you find out about who received the award?

The Awards are presented on the Friday night of the District Convention. No one except the selection committee knows the annual inductees until that time. Please, to respect the nominated Lions, they should not be informed of their nomination, but should be in attendance at the District Convention.

Sid L. Scruggs, of Vass, North Carolina, USA, was elected president of The International Association of Lions Clubs at the association's 93rd International Convention, held in Sydney, Australia, June 28-July 2, 2010. President Scruggs is a retired military and commercial airline pilot and a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy.

Using as his presidential theme Beacon of Hope, President Scruggs will make service to others – the core principal of Lions clubs around the world – the focal point of his presidency.

A member of the Vass Lions Club, he has held many offices in the association. In addition, he has presented at the USA/Canada and Europa Leadership forums and served as an instructor for the Lions Clubs International Leadership Institute and the District Governors-elect School.

In addition to his Lions activities,
President Scruggs is chairperson of the
board of directors of the Governor
Morehead School for the Blind, a
member of the board of the Raleigh
Lions Clinic for the Blind, Inc., and a
life member of the American Airlines
Grey Eagles Association and the Naval
Academy Alumni Association.

In 2010 he was elected to the United States Blind Golf Association Hall of Fame. He has also been presented with the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the highest award given by the State of North Carolina, and an honorary doctorate of humanities from World University.

In recognition of his service to the association, President Scruggs has received the 100% Club President Award, the Governor of Excellence Award, the Key of Nations Award for sponsoring more than 100 Lions members, the International Presidential Award and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association gives to its members. 
