State News



LION HAYNES H. TOWNSEND, INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR:

Director Townsend stated it was a pleasure to be in Georgia again, and thanked the Georgia Lions for allowing him and Donna the privilege to serve. He stated that talks are underway to see if there might be a move by LCI back into Cuba. Director Townsend stated that he had received a call from the Sight Services Chair at LCI who talked with him about a new program with a Corporation that makes eyeglass lenses. This corporation has offered a deal to Lions Clubs on their polycarbonate lenses. They would like to start with the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation since they have the new lens grinders and lens making machines there. They will sell the lens to the Lighthouse for \$1.00 per lens. He pointed out that the next Board Meeting will be in Cary, North Carolina in April. Director Townsend stated that there will be a Seminar at the International Convention in Seattle on Constitution and By-Laws. Lion Haynes will help to present this if it is approved by President Scruggs.

LION JAMES E. "JIM" ERVIN, PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT: Lions of Georgia the opportunity to express their opinion and hopefully to redistrict the state so that the Lions of

Georgia can move forward. He pointed out that redistricting does nothing for membership growth, and it does nothing for the development of leadership.

PIP Ervin stated that in January the LCI Board appointed the Global Membership Team that will take effect July 1. The purpose is to bring both together so that we can make the programs more beneficial to all levels of leadership development in the association. Lion Ervin pointed out that MD 18 has been blessed with great leadership: Dr. John Pearce, Dr. Beverly Roberts, Haynes Townsend, and Mark Miller. PIP Ervin stated that Mark Miller will be the Global Leadership area leader for the Southeastern United States. PCC Miller will continue to use the leaders in MD 18 and in Florida and South Carolina who have been leaders in helping to develop this. He urged Governors to continue to use persons who have been extremely effective on the MERL side as we look at bringing them either into the membership team or the leadership team. There is a deadline in March to have the Multiple District Coordinators put into place for both Leadership and Membership. By May all District persons

should be in place. The DG and 1st and 2nd VDGs should all be involved in making the choices of the persons who will be in these key positions for the next three years. He pointed out that PCC Miller's responsibility will be to train the Multiple District leadership people so that they can help train the district. Lion Miller will also be helping to train District people and also be doing club level training probably on an area more than just in the Multiple District. PCC Carl Harrell will be working with the membership side of it. He stated he felt there is a great opportunity to move Lionism forward in the southeast. LCI will be developing a database of all the Lions who have gone through leadership programs so that the current leadership can be encouraged to utilize those individuals. He commended the Council on their appointment of Kembra Smith and Dick Smith to the positions of GLT and GMT.

PIP Ervin stated that he has received from the Governors their recommendations for the International Awards. He stated that he and ID Haynes Townsend, and CC Grace Clower will begin to evaluate the recommendations. He pointed out that Governors will also be given the opportunity to recognize Lions at their District Conventions with Certificates of Appreciation from the speaker. Two additional Certificates of Appreciation will be given to each Governor to present at his District Breakfasts during the State Convention. PIP Ervin stated that he and Haynes would contact the Lions of Mississippi to try to get information for the Southeastern Breakfast at the International Convention.

PIP Ervin congratulated all the Lions, the Council, Gary at the Lighthouse, and Dr. John Pearce for the great job in bringing people together to make a commitment and being so successful in the campaign for the Lighthouse. He stated it was heartwarming to see the new building and the potential to move the services of the Lighthouse forward.

REDISTRICTING

After approving a redistricting plan on February 5, 2011, the Council of Governors unanimously, by electronic means, voted to revise the approved plan. The final redistricting plan is attached, along with a summary of information. This is the information that will be presented to the Lions of Georgia for a vote at the State Convention in June.

REDISTRICTING SUMMARY

A. Lions Clubs International By-Laws, Article VIII, Section 3 recognizes a district as one having 35 clubs in good standing and a total membership of at least 1,250.

B. Only 1 district in MD-18 meets the definition of a district according to LCI.

C. The Council of Governors feels that redistricting would revitalize all the other 5 districts by providing the financial support of additional membership and would expand the pool of quality leaders who have the knowledge and experience to fill key roles on the district cabinet. This redistricting would also help in filling chairperson positions. As a result, the clubs in the district would receive the support needed to thrive.

D. Therefore, the Council of Governors, on October 1, 2010, asked the Long-Range Planning Committee to develop two plans for redistricting. These two plans were presented to the Council at their meeting on February 5, 2011.

E. The Council unanimously voted to accept one of the plans (Plan B). This plan calls for a reduction from 6 districts to 4 districts. (See map on next page). The effective date of the implementation of the plan would be the later of July 1, 2013 or at the close of the International Convention.

F. If the Lions of Georgia approve the plan, it will be submitted to Lions Clubs International for their consideration at their Fall Board of Directors Meeting.

G. If the International Board approves the plan, there would be 6 District Governors elected in Spring, 2012 and 4 District Governors in Spring, 2013.

Savannah Lions Club

A number of dedicated, community-minded men met at the Savannah Hotel to begin one of Lionism's southernmost clubs. Father Ambrose of the Benedictine School explained the principles and organization of Lionism. On the evening of June 10, 1922 the Lions Club of Savannah received its official charter from representatives of the International Association of Lions from Chicago.

We have two main fundraisers: **Christmas Tree Sales**- An annual event since 1977 for the club and our largest fundraiser for the year, our tree lot is located in Daffin Park. We tag selected Frazier Firs at the tree farms in North Carolina in August and sales begin Thanksgiving week. **Broom/Mop Fairs** – are held throughout the year at various community events. The club's members can be seen in and around the Savannah community. You can also order brooms and mops on the club's web site.

Service Projects: **Project Vision** program provides vision screening, eye exams and eyeglasses for children in the Chatham County School System. **Used Eyeglasses Recycling**

We support: Project Vision, Lions Camp for the Blind, Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, Goodwill Industries, and The Salvation Army, Leader Dogs for the Blind, Recording for the Blind & Dyslexic and of course LCIF.







I am proud that we have very active LEO clubs, advisors and Lion volunteers working with our LEO's within our District.

TIFTON LIONS CLUB

On the fourth Wednesday noon of alternate months, the van from the Georgia Lions Lighthouse in Atlanta comes to Tifton to conduct the Vision Clinic held at the Tift County Neighborhood Center on South Central Avenue. Uninsured Georgians are given eye examinations and eyeglasses. Lighthouse director Karen Kaplan with assistant, Emily, Tifton Lions with the aid of Moultrie Lions Jan and Duncan Sinclair and Ivey Davis set up the diagnostic equipment; process the applicants, as Dr. Brett Wagenhorst conducts a complete medical examination. Those who need eyeglasses select style and receive new eyeglasses by mail. Those who wish and have recent prescriptions bypass the medical exam. If more serious medical problems are detected, applicants are given medical advice and follow-up examinations at the next Vision Clinic.



Other recent Tifton Lion activities include the annual Bar-B-Cue. On March 12 we served 500 chicken dinners, prepared by Hog-N-Bones Restaurant, to drive-through Tiftonites at the First United Methodist Church. We deliver to businesses whose employees could not leave work. On March 25 we managed the SPLOST election at North-East Precinct in Tifton. We sell mops and brooms.

The profits for these services go to the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, LCIF, and Georgia Lions Lighthouse, Leader Dog, and other Lion and community activities.

Macon Cherry Blossom Lions Club

The Cherry Blossom Lions Club is very active in the Metro Macon Community. We were chartered in 1955 as the SOUTHSIDE Community Lions Club. From that time we have been actively involved in our community for the betterment of the citizenry of MACON. In our early days, we started SOUTH MACON BOYS baseball. As you can guess the first team sponsored was appropriately named the LIONS.

We also started printing and installing the: "Enjoy the Scene ...Keep Macon Clean" signs around the city and on our highways. This was the precursor to the Macon-Bibb County Clean Community Commission. We sponsored Col. Robert SCOTT's: "GOD is My Co-Pilot" movie that premiered at the Grand Opera House where a plaque still hangs to commemorate this occasion. Also we worked hard to bring the Soap box derby back to Macon.

One of our (former) members, **Jim Woods** was friends with Mr. Wm. Fickling and knew about his "cherry" trees. Jim had also visited Washington D.C. on many occasions and had enjoyed the beauty of the cherry trees there. Jim planted the trees near his home and in his neighborhood. He had a vision that he challenged our LIONS Club with. "Let's plant these trees around the City of Macon and on the highways leading into our city. After we have planted thousands of these trees then we can start and build a festival with a theme around the CHERRY BLOSSOMS."

He drew plans out on a napkin with friends at a local restaurant while sharing coffee. Jim, along with several LIONS met with representatives of the Georgia DOT to find out the particulars and get permission to start planting the trees. Jim's dream has come true and our LIONS Club has made another significant impact on the city of MACON. More than that, we have provided hundreds of pairs of eyeglasses for the citizens of MACON who could not afford them worth many tens of thousands of dollars. We have also provided many hearing - aides and done hundreds of referrals to the GA Lions Lighthouse. We were instrumental in establishing the first Georgia Eye Bank. Also, we used to underwrite a nurse's scholarship's every year until the HOPE Scholarship program came into being.

We changed our name in 1994 to reflect our history in the starting and the inception of Macon's Cherry Blossom Festival! The Cherry Blossom Lions Club has been instrumental in so many things affecting the people of Macon and once we get it started we also drop back out of the lime light and let others take over. It is good to see your "baby" continue to grow!!

Recently we have been involved in gathering clothes and sending them for relief efforts in Africa and South America, providing eyeglasses for needy individuals in Macon and recycling thousands of pairs of used glasses and lots of hearing-aides every year. Our members may be few but all of us are actively involved in other organizations: church, theater, the arts, GIDEONS, and Project Linus. Our local chapter is almost 7 years old and has already made, collected and distributed over 25,000 blankets (HUGS) around the world!!

We also support the Georgia Lions Lighthouse, Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, Leader Dog, Canine Companions, LCIF, White Cane Day and our fellow LIONS around the world.

Already in our two year existence we have conducted an Eye Screening at the Elementary School, provided eye exams and glasses for several citizens; helped provide Christmas for needy families, and paid a utilities bill for another struggling family.

Most recently the club adopted as a project a young lady named Ravi. Ravi was born blind and has since lost both eyes to disease, but she hasn't let that slow her down. At eleven years old, she is in the Gifted classes at Putnam Middle School, active in cheerleading, and all her classmates see that she gets where she needs to be. Ravi's mother, Trina, was told by doctors that her daughter would never be able to do much in life because of her disability, but Ravi has consistently proved them wrong, both academically and physically.

Our club is learning all we can about Leader Dogs for the Blind, and working toward eventually sending Ravi to the Leader Dog School when she becomes 18. For now, we are planning a Kids 'n Coins program in Ravi's sixth grade classes so that her peers will feel they, too, are helping Ravi as she strives to become even more independent. We will also be sponsoring Ravi to the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind this summer.



The Lions Club of Eatonton has conducted several successful fund raisers one of which is our annual Chicken Que. We served over 300 plates last July and hope our 2nd Annual Event, scheduled for May 14th, will be twice as successful. In addition, we have operated booths at both the Arts and Crafts Festival in October and the Christmas Festival in December. Lions, LCIF Providing US\$1.25Million in Relief for Devastated Japan

In the case of disasters, we Lions are often the first to respond, and continue to provide for as long as it takes until all work is done. Lions Clubs International Foundation and Lions are providing relief in devastated Japan. The Tohoku Region Pacific Ocean Coast Earthquake is the worst earthquake to hit Japan in over 100 years triggered a powerful tsunami throughout the Pacific Ocean.

Lions Clubs International Foundation is providing over US\$1.25 million, or 100 million Japanese Yen, for immediate relief. This includes major catastrophe and emergency grant funds as well as designated donations from Lions around the world. The Foundation has also established a <u>designated fund</u> for Lions to directly support this disaster. LCIF is also monitoring the impact to other Pacific Ocean nations. Lions in Japan are coordinating their relief efforts through LionNet Japan and are using the Japan Lions Office as emergency relief headquarters. Japanese media, citing local and national police, said hundreds of people were dead and hundreds more missing. The 2:46 p.m. quake struck 373 kilometers (230 miles) from Tokyo, the United States Geological Survey said. In Sendai, 60,000 to 70,000 people are being evacuated to shelters in the area.

"I just returned from Christchurch, New Zealand, and I thought I had seen it all, but this is unbelievable. Looking to the extraordinary dimension of this earthquake and tsunami, LCIF and Lions are committed to providing immediate and long-term relief. Lions of Japan are often the first to respond to other disasters, and I ask all Lions of the world to show their solidarity and help the Japanese Lions during their time of need," said LCIF Chairperson Eberhard J. Wirfs.

LCIF has established a designated account for Lions around the world to directly support this disaster. Lions from around the world are responding generously. The 48th OSEAL Forum Committee has committed US\$10,000 and the Annur Town Lions Club in India has committed US\$5,000.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY - INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA JUNE 23 – JUNE 27, 2010

Approved a final plan to phase out the MERL team program, and its corresponding four separate chairperson positions by expanding the Global Membership Team (GMT) down to the multiple district and district level, and to consolidate the current chairperson positions of Membership, Extensions, Retention (M-E-R) into a single team. The plan also aims to transform the previous function of retention into a much broader focus of "club success" to better address the root causes of low retention. Additionally, the Leadership function in MERL, and its chairperson position will be separated from M-E- and R, and be elevated to its own structure, to be known as the Global Leadership Team (GLT), which will work alongside the expanded GMT in a highly integrated and interdependent way. Going forward, the interdependent structures of the GMT and GLT will better address regional growth needs while also focusing more efforts on club success and more leadership development at all levels of LCI to enhance our service mission.

PIP Jim Ervin is the current GMT Constitutional Area 1 Chair and GLT Constitutional Area 1 Chair

The Global Membership Team (GMT) in tandem with the Global Leadership Team (GLT) was developed to augment the local efforts of the DG teams, operating as action oriented, parallel, mutually supportive teams - each with an enhanced focus. The GMT concentrates on membership and club growth, and on club success. The integrated efforts of the GMT and multiple district and district GMTs will address regional growth and development needs while building our membership base, improving club health, and enhancing the quality of leadership at all levels of the association.

District Global Membership Team

District GMT member responsibilities include setting membership goals, implementing action plans, and communicating the goals and plans to the multiple district GMT. The district GMT structure is:

- District Governor
- 1st Vice District Governor
- 2nd Vice District Governor
- District GMT Coordinator, supported by Membership and Club Growth Team
- Club Success Team

Campus Club Specialist

District campus club specialists appointed by the GMT district coordinator team up with likeminded Lions to build and strengthen campus club membership.

Family and Women's Membership Development Specialist

District family and women's membership development specialists, appointed by the GMT district coordinator, are key contributors in the association's initiative to bring more families and women into Lions clubs.

New Club Extension

The following information applies to the organization of a new Lions club. This includes the formation of a traditional Lions club, Campus Lions club, Lioness Lions club and Leo Lions club.

Global Leadership Team (Lion Kembra Smith, PCC – MD GLT Coordinator)

The new Global Leadership Team (GLT) provides the needed focus on active leadership development, affording Lions Clubs International a solid foundation upon which to build. The GLT encourages the identification and development of leaders at all levels of the association, while providing necessary information, guidance and motivation. Operating as a parallel, mutually supportive specialized team with the Global Membership Team (GMT), the GLT provides for an enhanced focus on and support of leadership development, which is critical to the success of every LCI program and to the future vitality of the association as a whole.

GLT Structure

<u>The GLT structure</u> encompasses representation at the **international**, **multiple district**, **single district** and **district** levels and includes district governor teams, provides a comprehensive global platform for developing more qualified leaders from the club level up, while encouraging regional training and development approaches to address local needs.

Operating as an action-oriented, parallel, mutually supportive team with the <u>GMT</u>, the GLT was developed to augment the local efforts of our DG Teams. By integrating the efforts of the GLT, the GMT and our DG Teams, we will be better able to address regional growth and development needs, while building our membership base, improving club health, and enhancing the quality of our leadership at all levels of the association.

GLT - District: Each district has a GLT, comprised of a District GLT Coordinator and the District Governor Team, with the Second Vice District Governor serving as liaison to the DG Team. Other qualified Lions may be added as necessary. The GLT-D will work in cooperation with the GMT-D (DG Teams are core members of both GLT and GMT at the district level).GLT District Coordinators and other team members are appointed by District Governor, in consultation with the GLT Area Leader, GLT Multiple District Coordinator (where applicable) and First and Second Vice District Governors.

Leadership is critical to the overall success of any organization. An effective leadership team will provide the vision, guidance and motivation necessary for Lions Clubs International to continue to fulfill its mission of providing quality, relevant service to the global community. The GLT structure, which encompasses representation at the international, constitutional area, multiple district and district levels and includes district governor teams, provides a comprehensive global platform for developing more qualified leaders from the club level up, while encouraging regional training and development approaches to address local needs.

FIRST CLIENTS AT THE NEW LIGTHHOUSE CLINIC, January 19, 2011

Barbara of Lithonia, GA was the first patient to receive an eye exam in the new Lighthouse clinic. After hearing about the Lighthouse Foundation on television, Barbara decided she'd had enough of struggling to read the small type on signs and on television; she sat down and called the Lighthouse right away.



Barbara had not received a full eye exam in over four years. Without insurance or a job, she would have been able to afford new glasses without Lighthouse assistance.



Rebekah and Brenda-Ann are residents of the Blair House, a Christian woman's shelter in Douglasville. While the two friends came only to pick out Rebekah's glasses, a clinic opening gave Brenda-Ann an opportunity to get her eyes examined.

While she once worked as a certified medical assistant, even bringing Lighthouse glasses on mission trips to Peru, Brenda-Ann lost her job due to a debilitating eye disease which required expensive corrective surgery. Unable to return to work afterwards, she turned to the Blair House in 2009 and was recently reintroduced to the Lighthouse through Rebekah, who has received Lighthouse glasses in the past.

"I knew the Lighthouse, but never thought I'd need its services," says Brenda-Ann. "I'm more grateful than ever that an organization like this exists. Thank you! This is all such a blessing."

APRIL, but don't wait until then to start planning your club's participation. A few clubs report they are too small, or they are rebuilding, or not sure how to hold a White Cane Drive. NO club is too small (or too large) to participate. A White Cane Drive can be a terrific incentive for a rebuilding club. So, how about some ideas on how to begin or improve your club's efforts.

Here are some ideas:

* Place plastic jars on check-out counters of convenience and fast food stores. This could be done 4-6 weeks in April and can be handled by 1 or 2 Lions. Special jar lids and decals are available through White Cane Days, Inc.

* Write letters to businesses of your community soliciting donations. Then follow up with a personal visit.

* Hold a pancake breakfast, chili supper, chicken BBQ, or other project designated for White Cane.

* Get publicity through having a community leader (mayor, administrator, or commissioner) sign a proclamation declaring your club's White Cane Drive and publishing it in your local newspaper.

* If you have a Wal-Mart, K-Mart, Kroger's, or some other large retail outlet, approach management about a matching grant for White Cane.

* Utilize your White Cane efforts to educate your community about the Georgia Lions Lighthouse in general, and your club in particular. You may be able to recruit a few new members.

Clinic Locations

We currently have 17 clinic sites throughout the state, and we will expand to 19 soon. The sites include:

Albany, Athens, Atlanta (2), Augusta, Brunswick, Columbus, Dahlonega, Chamblee, Fayetteville, Jasper, Lawrenceville, Macon, Rome, Savannah, Statesboro, Tifton, Valdosta, and Waycross.



We have vision clinics in existing free clinics. Depending on location, clinics take place monthly, every other month, quarterly, or based on doctors' availability. The areas highlighted in blue on the map indicate counties where we currently hold clinics. Residents of every county in Georgia are eligible for Lighthouse services, and last year we served people in 152 of the state's 159 counties.

The Vision Clinic Program's Purpose and Goals

In November 2006, the Lions Lighthouse started a new vision clinic program. This program provides qualifying patients three very important vision services:

- 1. Full dilated eye exam (performed by either an ophthalmologist or optometrist).
- 2. One pair of eyeglasses every 3 years.
- 3. Follow-up care for chronic eye conditions, such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy.

There are several goals that the Lions Lighthouse would like to meet with this program:

- 1. To address the vision needs of the uninsured and financially needy in Georgia.
- 2. To deliver professional vision services throughout these sites on a consistent basis.
- 3. To increase Lion involvement throughout the state in addressing the problem of vision needs.

Clinic Locations

Please do not walk up at these clinics for eye care, and do not call them regarding your Lighthouse appointment. They are separate organizations and will not be able to help you. If you would like to attend a Lighthouse eye clinic, please fill out and return our <u>vision</u> <u>services application</u> (en español) along with the supporting documentation on page one. Once you are approved, we will contact you with a date, place, and time for your appointment. Thank you!

How to Apply for Services

If there are any persons applying for service at our vision clinic, please let them visit our website at <u>www.lionslighthouse.org/programs</u> **To be eligible for the program, they must:**

Have been a Georgia resident for at least one year. Be uninsured or underinsured. Fall within our income guidelines

In addition to the paper application, they must also submit: Proof of Identification, Proof of Georgia residency, Proof of Income, A copy of their current prescription if they have Medicaid or Medicare, A signed "Release of Information" form (included in the application packet).

A CHALLENGE:

Has been given to the Lions of 18-E to help our Lions Camp climb out of a very serious funding deficit! A Lion, who wishes to remain and shall remain anonymous, has offered to match individual donations to the Camp up to a grand total of **\$10.000**. To show the faith in Lions of 18-E, an advance donation of \$1,000 has been placed. At the present rate of donations, our Camp has enough reserve funds to keep the gates open for 2 to 3 years. After the remaining funds are used, the camp will become a memory only. This challenge will last until June 30, 2011. Individual Lions from 18-E can send their check to Dave Forrest, and the dollar amounts will be passed on to the challenger. As an example, your individual gift of \$100 will become a Camp donation of \$200. To show my (Dave Forrest) support, an initial check of \$200 will be given to the Camp.

The Camp has recently received a grant for \$419,500; however, these funds can only be used for capital expenditures. This will be spent for construction, renovations, and improvements. NONE of this money can be used for operating expenses of the camp. Georgia Lions will have a greater and much improved camp, which will meet state, federal, and ACA guidelines; however, the Lions must step forth with funds to pay for daily operations. Many thanks to Camp President Frank Spinney and to District 18-E and Columbus Noon Lion's member Alice Stagg for making this grant possible!

25 Project Ideas to Serve Children



1. Organize a monthly food drive and donate collections to the food pantry.

2. Provide meals at a homeless shelter.

3. Assist with a school lunch program.

4. Make hygiene kits for children at homeless shelters.

5. Collect children's clothing and shoes for a shelter for battered women and children.

6. Collect suitcases or backpacks for orphaned children; fill with school supplies.

7. Work with healthcare professionals to provide free immunizations.

8. Work with healthcare professionals to provide health screenings or free clinics to provide physical, dental, hearing exams; and follow up with assistance, if necessary (professional referrals, assistive devices).

9. Assist at children's camps focusing on diabetes, blindness, deafness or hearing loss, and other camps serving children with special needs.

10. Make baby supply kits for newborns in need.

11. Collect safe soft toys (no small, removable parts) and/or coloring books for a children's hospice or children's hospital.

12. Supply Braille and large-print books for children who are blind or visually impaired.

13. Help to provide safety identification for children with serious/chronic illnesses (medical bracelets, necklaces, etc.).

14. Establish a tutoring program (reading, math, science) for children or youth.

15. Develop a reading program or "story day" for preschool and elementary grade school children.

16. Team up with a youth organization to mentor atrisk youth.

17. Refurbish used bicycles and distribute to children and youth.

18. Assist local law enforcement with a neighborhood photo identification project for children. Georgia Masons are presenting **GACHIP** program *free of charge to the public*

19. Collect usable furniture for an orphanage or family in need,

20. Organize a book or board game drive for a community center, children's after-school center, hospital facility or school library.

21. Remodel a children's center or school room; paint, repair and landscape.

22. Provide safe soft teddy bear toys (no small, removable parts) to local emergency service professionals for presentation to children during an emergency.

23. Donate blankets (or crochet, knit or make fleece blankets) for orphanages, foster children or other children in need.

24. Prepare and send handmade cards to youth affiliated with children's shelters and organizations.

25. Sponsor a sports day for children and youth facing physical challenges and other disabilities.

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Are Carbs the Enemy?

The debate over eating and diabetes By Tracey Neithercott

When it comes to diabetes, there may be no topic more fraught with controversy than carbohydrates. Sure, everyone agrees that the body uses carbs for energy in the form of glucose. But how much carbohydrate should people with diabetes really eat? That question has divided researchers, doctors, dietitians—and people with diabetes themselves. Some insulin users in particular find that their blood glucose is far easier to control when they limit the carbs in their diet. Others think people with diabetes deserve to eat (and enjoy) the same healthy diet recommended for all Americans. All are deeply passionate on the subject. And, in a sense, they may all be right.

Today, most people with diabetes are encouraged to eat a balanced diet of lean meats and dairy, whole grains, healthy fats, and fruits and vegetables. This concept is backed by the American Diabetes Association (ADA) as well as the American Heart Association and American Dietetic Association, and it incorporates recommendations from agencies like the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health and Human Services. While the ADA does not specify exact grams or percentages of calories from carbohydrate, the approach is generally moderate in carbs. According to Marion J. Franz, MS, RD, CDE, a registered dietitian and nutrition/health consultant in Minneapolis, studies have shown that people with diabetes generally get about 40 to 45 percent of their calories from carbs.

The moderate-carb approach stresses that grains should come in the form of whole grains instead of refined grains (like white flour), which have been stripped of important vitamins and minerals. Research has shown that eating a moderate-carb, highfiber diet (like one that includes whole grains) may improve post-meal glucose levels and lower the risk for cardiovascular disease.

What's more, foods that contain carbohydrate also tend to contain a lot of other healthy things. Consider the four major categories of foods that have carbs: fruits, vegetables, grains, and dairy. Many of the individual foods in those categories are nutrition powerhouses. Legumes like lentils and black beans are chock-full of soluble fiber, which helps lower cholesterol levels. Veggies and fruits are a great low-calorie source of vitamins and minerals. Low-fat dairy products provide calcium and, in many cases, vitamin D.

Not only that, but carbs are an efficient source of energy. "Like gasoline powers a car, glucose powers your body," says Neal Barnard, MD, adjunct associate professor of medicine at the George Washington University School of Medicine and author of *Dr. Neal Barnard's Program for Reversing Diabetes.* "The idea that carbohydrate is a problem is, in my opinion, a mistaken one."

According to Franz, as long as people eat less or cover their carb intake with medications, they can keep blood glucose levels in check with a healthy diet. "What determines the blood glucose level," she says, is "certainly the amount of carbs you eat, but it's the balance between carbs and insulin."

What's more, she points out, and the moderate diet is all about freedom. "If someone told me you have diabetes but you can't eat carbs, I'd be floored," says Franz. "I would cry out in alarm and say, 'But I deserve the right to eat healthfully, and I can keep my blood glucose in control by watching my portion sizes and, if necessary, taking medication.' "

Indeed, a lot of those newly diagnosed with diabetes are happy to find out that they can still have most of their favorite foods, in moderation—as long as they lower their blood glucose with medication and exercise. (People who control their diabetes without medication or who take oral drugs will need to watch how carbs affect their glucose levels and then work with their doctor to determine the right number of carbs and amount of medication needed to stay in good glucose control.) Gone are the days of "diabetic diets" that were meager and confining. Today, the idea is that people with diabetes can eat everything recommended to those without the disease. "If we look at what's important for all of us," says Franz, "it's important to eat healthy foods in the right portion sizes."

The Low-Carb Approach

When Richard Bernstein, MD, FACE, FACN, started eating a low-carbohydrate diet 40 years ago, he had heart disease and kidney disease, complications of uncontrolled type 1 diabetes. Bernstein says he cut the majority of carbs from his diet, and eventually his complications retreated.

The Fat Question

Both sides mostly agree that a low-carb approach will end up being high in fat, including saturated fat. What they don't agree on is whether that's a bad thing. According to low-carb proponents, the idea that saturated fat causes cardiovascular disease is misguided. "There's some misunderstanding about saturated fats," says Frank Nuttall, MD, PhD, chief of the Endocrinology, Metabolism & Nutrition Section at the Minneapolis VA Health Care System and professor of medicine at the University of Minnesota. "We really don't have good evidence that saturated fat causes coronary heart disease. It can raise cholesterol levels, but whether that's sufficient to raise the risk for coronary heart disease is not conclusive."

The Right Way?

Part of the reason for the great carb divide is that science hasn't settled the debate. In addition to the research that demonstrates the success of a low-carb diet, there are also plenty of studies that show benefits of high-carb diets. Barnard's 2006 article in *Diabetes Care*, for instance, found improved cholesterol and decreased A1C in people on a vegan diet (consisting of no animal food or products, including dairy) that was a whopping 75 percent carbohydrate. Barnard supports a vegan diet because it beat out both low-carb and moderate diets when it came to heart health and glycemic control.

Fellow Lions,

I am deeply humbled by the generous outpouring of support from Lions worldwide to my call last week to donate funds to the Foundation's Japan Relief Fund. Already, LCIF has received donations or <u>commitments exceeding US\$6 million</u>, including US\$3 million that the Lions of Japan are working to raise themselves during their own crisis. Again, it's so very humbling to see such compassion by the network of caring Lions and Leos worldwide. I thank all who have already donated from the bottom of my heart.



With the expected death toll now exceeding 18,000 and rising, the devastation is clearly greater than anyone could have imagined. And more than 400,000 people are still in shelters, in the cold, often going without a hot meal for days on end.

Now that the roads have re-opened, Lions from all over Japan are sending relief aid from every corner of the country -- 30 tons of rice is being sent from Sapporo, US\$50,000 worth of baby formula from Hokkaido, and women's health products from the southern area of Shikoku - all through the Lions network in Japan. Within a day of the disaster, many courageous clubs distributed 20 tons of food, water and emergency supplies, despite great risks and challenges to themselves. Even our Lions bluecolored Lions relief tents are being delivered to give shelter for Lions volunteers and other relief workers in the hardest-hit areas.



To distribute the aid effectively, the Lions of Japan quickly set up four Lions relief aid warehouses in affected areas. Lions are coordinating relief aid distribution with local government officials and with the Japanese Red Cross. As a result, Lions are helping coordinate blood donation campaigns within Japan.

As you know, we have 31 Lions clubs in Sendai - the largest city affected by the quake - and nearly a club in every town up and down the coastline. Whether its clothes and food today, or shelter next week, or a wheel chair the week after, Lions will be there to give dignity to those who have suffered such unimaginable pain and suffering.

While many of you have <u>already generously donated</u>, for which I am very thankful, please encourage your fellow Lions, Leos and friends to also <u>donate</u>. Please know that every donation will be put to careful use, and 100 percent will go to the cause. Also, donations received between March 11 and June 30, 2011 will be eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowships.

I am again humbled by your generosity to date. The Lions of Japan have always been there for the rest of us in times of need. So I am proud of you, and never prouder to be a Lion, when we come to their aid in the wake of this historic, awful tragedy.

Lions, LCIF Providing US\$1.25 Million in Relief for Devastated Japan

In the case of disasters, we Lions are often the first to respond, and continue to provide for as long as it takes until all work is done. Lions Clubs International Foundation and Lions are providing relief in devastated Japan. The Tohoku Region Pacific Ocean Coast Earthquake is the worst earthquake to hit Japan in over 100 years triggered a powerful tsunami throughout the Pacific Ocean. Lions Clubs International Foundation is providing over US\$1.25 million, or 100 million Japanese Yen, for immediate relief. This includes major catastrophe and emergency grant funds as well as designated donations from Lions around the world. The Foundation has also established a designated fund for Lions to directly support this disaster. LCIF is also monitoring the impact to other Pacific Ocean nations. Lions in Japan are coordinating their relief efforts through LionNet Japan and are using the Japan Lions Office as emergency relief headquarters. Japanese media, citing local and national police, said hundreds of people were dead and hundreds more missing. The 2:46 p.m. quake struck 373 kilometers (230 miles) from Tokyo, the United States Geological Survey said. In Sendai, 60,000 to 70,000 people are being evacuated to shelters in the area.

"I just returned from Christchurch, New Zealand, and I thought I had seen it all, but this is unbelievable. Looking to the extraordinary dimension of this earthquake and tsunami, LCIF and Lions are committed to providing immediate and long-term relief. Lions of Japan are often the first to respond to other disasters, and I ask all Lions of the world to show their solidarity and help the Japanese Lions during their time of need," said LCIF Chairperson Eberhard J. Wirfs.

LCIF has established a designated account for Lions around the world to directly support this disaster. Lions from around the world are responding generously. The 48th OSEAL Forum Committee has committed US\$10,000 and the Annur Town Lions Club in India has committed US\$5,000. Donors can:
